SHORT the Squirrel

A literacy initiative promoting waiting time is reading time!



A "SHORT" HISTORY: Dr. Dee Dupree Bennett and Monica Anderson Young have created a literacy initiative for Alabama called SHORT the Squirrel. The idea originated in Mobile, where Monica's daughter, McRae Young, a young assistant district attorney, noticed how many children were languishing in courtrooms with idle time since electronics are not allowed, and many families did not pack anything to fill the time. The initiative received Governor Ivey's endorsement, and SHORT was named Alabama's Literacy Mascot!



CELEBRATING READING: Over 30,000 children learned about SHORT through an interactive virtual reading pep rally as a birthday celebration across the state for SHORT's first birthday – a reading pep rally filmed in Montgomery's Rosa Parks Theatre where some beloved university mascots wished SHORT a happy birthday. Education influencer Principal Gerry Brooks emceed (he's also a board member). SHORT began to make in-squirrel and virtual visits to schools to promote reading and became very popular this summer in the many reading camps hosted by Alabama school districts.



INTERACTIVE MATERIALS: While the idea started as providing activity sheets for the Mobile courtrooms, SHORT the Squirrel has grown exponentially in scope. The first literacy kit, *SHORT in Court*, is in all 67 Alabama courtrooms. Based on the premise that waiting time is reading time, *SHORT Gets Sick* is being piloted in Birmingham's Children's Hospital waiting room. The Southeast Alabama Regional Planning and Development Commission Head Start/ Early Head Start Program is sharing *SHORT Gets Sick* in a back-to-school initiative. *SHORT Recycles* was piloted in Troy City Schools as part of an Earth Day celebration. This fall SHORT's newest title, *SHORT's Money Tree*, introduces financial literacy while continuing to promote reading.



IN FLIGHT FOR 2022: Montgomery and Monroe County Schools were selected to pilot SHORT's Money Tree in conjunction with Alabama Securities Commission's emphasis on financial literacy. We are seeking two more counties (urban and rural) to pilot SHORT's Money Tree with second graders in April. This includes an accompanying lesson plan tied to state math and reading standards. SHORT's Feelings will be produced with the Alabama Department of Mental Health's partnership. Our first trade book, Why SHORT Loves to Read, will be funded through a grant from the Daniel Foundation. Provide trade books for reading center, read aloud or story time (sample list provided). Promote literacy with color-by-sightword pages (included). Arrange a special visit to the library as SHORT's favorite place. Host literacy & language circles using the questions related to SHORT's part of speech and squirrelly words (included).

Exploring, Processing and Logical Reasoning	2a: Represent and solve problems involving addition and subtraction; Add and subtract within 20.	 Build addition/subtraction facts using "A-Corn" chips, corn puffs, or corn nuts as manipulatives. Measure items in the classroom using SHORT's tail or Moon Pies and record findings for data analysis (chart and image included). Fill a jar with corn puffs, nuts, or small pinecones and have students estimate how many are inside the jar and record their guesses.

Provide a cape or use a household item (towel, pillowcase, etc.) as a literacy cape to promote captions such as: Reading as a super power, Reading taking you anywhere, etc. Design a cape (included) to showcase things that represent each student. NOTE – New! SHORT's super reading, satin, child-sized cape is now available at www.short-thesquirrelstore.com as several educators have requested. \$10/each so perhaps one classroom version for the day's super reader! This lesson plan promotes reading with cross-curricular activities to emphasize Alabama geography and history.

SHORT Adventures

Referencing the teaser video or first few minutes of the birthday video, have students view the many waterways of Alabama and locate their community waterways. Determine the following:

- 1. What direction did SHORT travel to get from Montgomery to Mobile?
- 2. Besides a boat, how else could SHORT have traveled to Mobile?
- 3. What is the best for SHORT to travel to our community?
- 4. What direction will SHORT travel to get to Huntsville from Mobile?

Alabama is known for its wildlife and environmental conservation. Ask students to identify the wildlife SHORT saw as he traveled to Mobile. Then, create a list of wildlife they may see in the community where they live.

- · What are some SYNONYMS for HAPPY that will describe a birthday party?



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SQUIRRELLY Words

 Create a list of HOMONYMS that might be part of SHORT's Celebration. Examples:

 Create a list of ACTION WORDS that one might identify when watching a Mardi Gras parade.

run, climb, scamper, eat, stare, etc.

- Create a list of new vocabulary related to Mardi Gras (included).
 Cape, train, beads, float, mask, etc.
- Explore vowels by creating a list of words that change with just a silent 'e'!
 cap/cape hop/hope man/mane rob/robe plan/plane

SHORT Order

To prepare for the reading celebration, SHORT had to complete a series of tasks. Using the sequencing cards (included), help SHORT keep his tasks in order and understand the process of planning the event. Tasks include: travel, invite, plan, host, thank you)

Using the notecard (included), encourage students to write a thank you note to someone who helps them 'celebrate' reading!



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SHORT Math:

- Using small snack cake or a Mardi Gras King cake, estimate measurements (or fractions) needed to share the special treat.
- Practice patterns by making a bead Mardi Gras necklace or crown.
- Using wrapped Moon Pies or the squirrel tails (included), have students
 measure items in the classroom and complete the chart below to compare
 shortest to longest.



- Using the city map (included), encourage students to create a tour of their town spotlighting the special places to visit in the community.
- Have each student select a favorite book or book character and host a Mardi Gras book parade throughout the school.
- Taking the advice of Ms. Karyn Tunks, author of Mardi Gras in Alabama, encourage student to explore writing using journaling, story starters, and creative writing based on their own experiences or desires to expand knowledge.



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








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
Imagine how your cape (or train) would be designed.
